Instructions

- Students will be assigned one of the individuals from the list above to complete their project.
- Students will need to research their person by using 2-3 non-fiction books or reliable online sources that provide adequate information about their chosen individual. The more information you gather, the better prepared you will be to complete your project.
- Students will need to draw a picture of how their person may have looked including their attire. The picture must fill a sheet of paper 8.25 inches by 11.75 inches or larger.
- The following questions should be answered about the drawing in the oral presentation. What clothes is the person wearing? What led you to believe that they would wear those clothes? Is the person drawn old or young? Why? What culture are they from and how did you represent that in their features?



- Students will need to write a two-page essay (at least five paragraphs) on this character. Answer the following questions. What were the major events in their life? What did they accomplish? What are they remembered for? What were their virtues? Use examples from their life to demonstrate their virtues.
- Students will need to prepare and memorize a 4-5 minute presentation on their character. The presentation should include the major events in that person's life along with an explanation of the drawing that they did of their character and why they represented them as they did. The presentation should also touch on the virtues of their character with one or two specific examples demonstrating those virtues.
- This project will count towards next quarter's history grade and should be completed with care.
